I think I weighed seven something, but, um, I was, I was pretty junky. I was chunky, I wouldn't say I was fat growing up, but I would say I was chunky and I never lost my baby fat.

Anyway, it's a picture of me. It looks like I'm in a little, it's a black and white photograph. It looks like I have a little dress on, I think I see my toes without socks on them.

My dad is holding me and he is in his looks like his air force uniform. He's a very striking, handsome man. Looks like I might be reaching up to his cheek with one of my hands and he sold him my other hand with his with his hand.

A little story I was due in March and I didn't, I wasn't born until April 16th and my dad was on leave, I think in March.

And he and my mom would go out for, I don't think he was home for too long.
