Vision 2030 Campaign Strategic Initiatives

The Vision 2025 Campaign is a multi-year initiative that parallels Wartburg's ambitious plans to transform parts of its campus in response to unprecedented changing demographics. Today, nearly one in six New Yorkers are over 65, a larger share of the state's population than ever before. By 2040, this population is expected to increase by 25 percent and the number of individuals over 85 is expected to increase by 35 percent.



The availability of senior housing is not keeping pace with the needs of the growing senior population.





Independent Living Expansion

The current lack of senior housing in Westchester County is alarming. With an exponential increase in the 65+ population expected over the next decade, housing insecurity will be among the most critical challenges facing seniors and their families, and it will continue to grow over the next 25 years.

Wartburg offers a range of independent living options in a vibrant, welcoming community.

In addition to Lohman Village's 31 step-free townhomes and the 61 supportive senior apartments that make up the Friedrich's Residence, Wartburg is planning an independent living expansion which will offer active seniors 225 well-appointed units boasting over 14,000 square feet of amenity space. Construction scheduled to begin in 2025.





Memory Care Expansion

With the number of older Americans rapidly growing over the next decade, so too will the number of new and existing cases of Alzheimer's and related diseases.

In response, Wartburg has completed a comprehensive Memory Care expansion on its 34-acre campus.

Opened in April of 2024, The Berkemeier Living Center is state-of-theart facility that brings resources and support to those affected by dementia and Alzheimer's. It provides 64 units of special needs assisted living. A residential scale household model has been employed in the planning of the building to provide more intimate surroundings for residents, staff, and families. Other considerations include keeping short walking distances, utilizing large windows with enhanced views, and maximizing the beneficial effects of natural light. These features, combined with high efficiency building systems will ensure a rich, healing environment for living.

Skilled Nursing Facility Transformation

Rounding out the plans for Wartburg's campus transformation is a comprehensive review of its Skilled Nursing Facility (Waltemade building).

At the heart of Wartburg's mission is an enduring commitment to serving those with the greatest needs. Wartburg is an important healthcare provider and a valuable resource for low-and moderate-income older adults, with 85% of its long-term Nursing Home residents at or below the poverty line.

Funding is secured and plans in place to convert this space into 100 affordable housing apartments.

Creating a Clean Environment to Live and Work

Wartburg's tradition of caring for the community includes a deep commitment to the environment. In 2013, Wartburg's Friedrichs Residence was the first construction project in Mount Vernon to obtain a **LEED** (**Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design**) Gold Certification by the U.S. Green Building Council. This was a landmark accomplishment in green multi-family housing.

The following year, Wartburg's Rehabilitation and Adult Day Care Center also received a **LEED Gold Certification**, signifying that a building is exemplary in conserving energy, lowering operating costs and being healthy for occupants.



Wartburg is the first-long term care facility in Westchester County to receive a Westchester County Eco Award. This award recognizes those individuals and institutions who contribute to making Westchester a great place to live, work and visit by improving and caring for the local environment and its sustainability.
